Ways to refer to future time

Future time: Definitions

English grammar provides a number of ways to indicate the future nature of an occurrence. Some argue that English does not have a future tense—that is, a grammatical form that always indicates futurity—nor does it have a mandatory form for the expression of futurity. However, there are several generally accepted ways to indicate futurity in English, and some of them—particularly those that use *will* or *shall*—are frequently described as future tense.

Future time: Definitions

Tense (in English) consists of only two options, as mentioned above: past and present. For lack of a special future tense, the language must resort to a number of different constructions to express future time,

Future time: Definitions

"[T]he future tense has a different status from the other tenses. Rather than being a form of the verb, it is expressed by the modal auxiliary will. It's no accident that the future shares its syntax with words for necessity (must), possibility (can, may, might), and moral obligation (should, ought to), because what will happen is conceptually related to what must happen, what can happen, what should happen, and what we intend to happen. The word will itself is ambiguous between future tense and an expression of determination (as in Sharks or no sharks, I will swim to Alcatraz), and its homonyms show up in free will, strong-willed, and to will something to happen. The same ambiguity between the future and the intended can be found in another marker for the future tense, going to or gonna. It's as if the language is affirming the ethos that people have the power to make their own futures."

Simple Present:

The company board meets tomorrow at 3.00 pm. Interest is paid at the end of each month.

Function: a scheduled, often repeated event

Present Continuous:

We are introducing new software in the planning department.

The managing director is arriving this afternoon.

Function: plans and arrangements

Be to/Be about to:

Twenty-five junior managers are to be promoted next week.

The company is about to make a major investment.

Function: realisation of a previous decision

Going to/Planning to/Intending to/Expecting to:
A new headquarters is going to be built next year.
We are planning to expand into Asia.
We are intending to recruit 100 new staff.
We are expecting to make a substantial profit.

Function: a programmed objective that is likely to happen

Plan to/Expect to/Want to:

They plan to start production next year.

They expect to lose money on the deal.

We want to return to profit by the end of the year.

Function: a projected, less certain future objective

Hope to/Mean to/Would like to:
We hope to reduce costs considerably.
We mean to fight the hostile takeover bid.
We would like to set up a joint venture.

Function: a projected, less certain future objective

May, Might:

Prices may increase in the third quarter.

Unemployment might decline towards the end of the year.

Function: indication of level of probability of a future occurrence

Can, Could:

We can offer a 5% discount on bulk orders.

The company could consider launching a new service.

Function: indication of level of probability of a future occurrence

Must:

Sales must expand in the coming year if we are to survive.

Function: indication of level of probability (obligation) of a future occurrence

Shall, Should:

Shall we ask for a bank loan?

We should consider the possibility of reducing expenses.

Function: suggestions/recommendations for future action

Will:

Next year, I think your contract will be renewed. I will contact you tomorrow.

We will offer better conditions.
Will you let me know what you think?
If I can help, I will.

Function: predictions and promises about the future (probability); willingness

Would:

If I could help, I would.

Would you mind waiting for five minutes?

Function: willingness (conditional); request for agreement
