PHRASAL VERBS WITH 'GO'

#### 1. To go off (to explode)

I would ask the Commissioner to address that in his response tomorrow, because it is a time bomb waiting to go off.

#### 2. To go through with sth (to persevere)

If you <u>go through with</u> an action you have decided on, you do it, even though it may be very unpleasant or difficult for you.

### 3. To go over sth (to examine)

Forensic scientists are going over the victim's flat in a search for clues about the murderer.

#### 4. To go before sth (to precede)

We cannot ignore what has gone before and pretend that everything is alright.

### 5. To go down \*(to decrease)

The price of hairdryers has <u>gone down</u> recently. \*\*(*sink*) The ship <u>went down</u> after it hit an iceberg. \*\*\*(*sunset*) During the summer the sun goes down later in the evening.

### 6. To go on about (talk too much)

She is always going on about her job.

## 7. To go through sth \*(to examine carefully)

I need to have my lawyer go through this contract before I sign it.

\*\*(to experience difficulties)

I would never want to go through what she has.

#### 8. To go without sth (to abstain from)

A camel can go without water for many days.

9. **To go into** sth (*to discuss in detail or at length*) She didn't <u>go into</u> the reasons for the move

## To go along with (to agree with or follow.)

Tommy usually goes along with what I say. He trusts me.

**To go by** *(to pass)*. Three hours went by incredibly fast.

**To go with** (*to match, to be similar to*). My shirt and pants are both blue. They go with each other
