 - **Turn back:** reverse direction and retrace one's route.

 - **Turn down:** to refuse or decline a request.

 - **Turn in:** to submit something.
He turned in his paperwork to the main office.
 - **Turn into:** to change into something different, to transform.
The carriage turned into a pumpkin at midnight.

- **Turn off:** power down, to stop a device by switching it off.

Turn off the tv if no one is watching it.

- **Turn on:** to start a machine or device.

My computer won't turn on.

- **Turn out:** result, end up.

I had hoped our first meeting would turn out better.

- **Turn to:** to consult for advice.

I'm sorry, but I had no one else to turn to.

- **Turn up:** to show up, to appear suddenly.

I don't like people turning up without an appointment.
