





THE IMPORTANCE OF STARTING A NEW PARAGRAPH

«Using white space helps the reader process the information in the story/work, gives their eyes a break and keeps them interested. Look at each page as if it were a work of art.

Some sentences will have more impact on their own.

Other sentences need more information and will evolve into a long paragraph of vital information. [...] **[K]eep in mind that the longer the paragraph, the more chance that someone will skip it.** Our eyes tend to naturally look for white space.

And the sentences closest to the white space are the ones most remembered»





MECHANICS OF WRITING

SOME GENERAL RULES

- AVOID JARGON (or explain)
- MAKE IT SIMPLE (in content and style)
- SELECT THE STUFF

- USE EXAMPLES AND METAPHORS
- DON'T DWELL ON TECHNICAL ASPECTS
- DON'T BE POMPOUS

- SHORTEN YOUR SENTENCES
- DON'T DWELL ON SECONDARY CLOSES
- DIVIDE THE TEXT INTO PARAGRAPH

“We notice language when it’s awkward and may blame ourselves for not being smart enough to figure it out.

When the writing is good, we notice the ideas and the data”
