Hunters and gatherers

Simple technologies, labour distinction based on gender and age, basic familiar settlements, egalitarian political system. Subsistence, nomadic/nonnomadic

Simple technologies used for gardening; labour distinction based on gender and age; A few staple food, such as: tubers, corn, dry rice; reduced surplus production. Rights to land based on lineage. Largely semi-nomads. Small settlements 100-500 peoples


Horticulturalists



Agriculturalists

Sedentary peoples, complex technology (i.e. ploughs and droughts animal; irrigation systems). Complex division of labour, based on a religious/sociopolitical organisation (i.e. priests, blacksmiths, chiefs, warriors...). Big surplus stocked.

Semi-nomad or (rarely) sedentary societies living mostly in symbiosis with agriculturalists with whom they practice barter. Simple subdivision of labour based on age and gender. Most communities are very small in number, due to the precariousness of their subsistence conditions and the need of flexility. Very strong and often ritually marked bond between males and their cattle.

Pesants

Sedentary communities based on agricultural economy. Today most people live in this condition. Access to land is not based on ancestral territories, in that land is a good one can buy with money. A huge surplus can be produced and economy is governed by market.


Qualitative research cycle
