






Primary Sources – Definition

- A primary source is an original, "first-hand", or "eye-witness" account offering an inside view.
- It contains new information (new at the time it was created, that is) that has not been interpreted, evaluated, paraphrased, or condensed.
- Such sources are usually created during or very close to the time of the events they report on.
- The author of a primary source typically provides direct impressions of events he or she is reporting on.


Primary Sources - Letters





Secondary Sources - Definition


- A secondary source provides "second-hand" information that has been digested, analyzed, reworded or interpreted.
- Secondary sources are often written well after the events they report on, and can put past information into its historical context.







Wikipedia - Tips


Do **NOT** use Wikipedia as either a Primary or Secondary source in your research.
