The Business Judgment Rule in Action: A Comparative Analysis of Case Studies and its Application in Highly Risky Decisions (by Erfan Samari, Elaheh Najafianvari, SeyedAlireza Aljaber).

The paper is well structured and has an adequate number of pages. However, the chosen topics are dealt with rather quickly and there are many repetitions.

The decision to present a comparison between different legal systems is very good, considering the subject matter.

The bibliography is good.

EU Anti-Dumping Regulations: How companies must ensure fair trade (by Leonardo Ricci, Emma Orzan, Paolo Petelin).

The paper is well structured, with a summary and a clear and systematic division into paragraphs. Conclusions are missing.

The topic is well addressed, despite its complexity, and the bibliography is quite appropriate.

The Mobility Directive and EU Company Freedom (by Sima Moeini, Nazanin Zahra Kaffash, Giorgia Romeo).

The paper presents a list of contents rather than a summary.

The topics chosen are appropriate. There are some repetitions and a few conceptual errors.

The citation of the directive in Italian is not understandable.

The bibliography is appropriate.

The Shareholder Rights Directives (by Anna Merlo, Marco Andreotti, Sofia Mocnich).

The paper is somewhat sparse and does not take a systematic approach. It highlights some points relating to the content of the two directives on shareholder rights but does so in a rather haphazard manner. Furthermore, the perspective appears to be focused partly on Italian legislation (Despite the instructions to write an assignment on European Company Law; see Moodle page).

The idea of Q&As is appealing but not suited to the type of work that was required.

The bibliography is limited.

The EU Shareholder Rights Directive and Its Impact on Italian Companies (by Yasmina Kavianifar, Amirhossein Latifi Navid, Amirarjang Peykararafatideh).

The paper does not have a summary, and the text is very sparse. The little that is written is correct but could have been explored in more depth.

Despite the instructions to write an assignment on European Company Law (see Moodle page), the paper discusses Italian law.

The bibliography is also limited.
