

HISTORY OF MEDIEVAL AND MODERN LAW

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Classes coming up: 2nd semester

CFU: 9; 60 hours

Course contents:

The *Course* is composed of 60 hours, and aims to provide, starting from the historical and juridical Roman experience, the essential knowledge to grasp the evolution of the European legal and cultural culture of the Medieval and Modern Age. Attending students (according to the methods of attendance register that will be expounded during the first meetings) will be offered – as a methodological key to legal phenomenology – a purely historic approach, which is the fundamental technical and training tool for understanding and knowingly utilizing current arrangements of contemporary law.
